MUSICIAN BIOS

The McAuley Boys are an R&B/Pop vocal group from London, Ontario. The four brothers, Gary, George, Mark and Randy McAuley, have enjoyed a recording and performance career that spans over three decades in the music industry.

Their parents, Winston and Rita, immigrated to Canada from Grenada, W.I. in the late 1960's and settled in London a couple of years later. Both Winston and Rita graduated from the University of Western Ontario, with Winston earning his Masters degree at Laurier University. Rita, ran the London Montessori School for more than 45 years.

They kept the tradition of music alive in their home. All four brothers studied piano. After years of practice, Kiwanis Music Festivals, school assemblies, local recitals and talent shows, oldest brother Gary decided to turn his attention to Pop music from Classical music. While attending the Faculty of Music at Western, he wrote and recorded original music in his spare time, eventually pivoting to singing with his brothers at various talent shows and local events. The brothers played their first gig at a luncheon for the Congress of Black Women, London Chapter, of which their mother Rita was a member (and later President).

It wasn't until Gary met with legendary music producer, David Foster in 1994, that he decided to formalize the group. In that meeting, Foster made a comment about what it took to 'make it' in the music business: "Just keep doin' it!", Gary shared what he had learned with his mother, who suggested that he record a Christmas cassette with his brothers and release it that year. Gary quickly produced the album and by December 1 the 'Boys' were promoting it on radio and TV stations and in malls across Ontario. The album art was illustrated by Gary's high school friend and future Academy Award nominated artist, Maciek Szczerbowski.

Gary decided he and his brothers should go professional and named the group "The McAuley Boys". They sold their first album independently, and word of the group spread quickly!

Building on that initial release, the boys released their full length CD, *Wonderful Christmas Time* the following year. Funded by their mom and her sister Noreen, Gary produced the album in one week, with the help of some dear friends: Dan Brodbeck (now director of the Fanshawe Music Industry Arts program), and his song writing partner at the time, Stephan Moccio (Celine Dion, Miley Cyrus, The Weeknd). At its peak in 1996/1997, *Wonderful Christmas Time* was the second highest successful holiday album release behind international recording artist (and fellow Canadian) Bryan Adams.

Their first original studio album, *In Another Lifetime* (written and co-produced by Gary) garnered a 1997 Juno Award nomination for Best Soul/R&B Album of the Year. "Down Down Down" and a remake of "I Just Want To Be Your Everything" both quickly became international hits. The title track on The Boys third album, *My Heaven*, and "By The Way" cracked the MuchMusic Playlist Top 10.

In the following years, second youngest brother Mark, released a solo album entitled *Midnight*



under the name Mac Graham. The title track "Midnight" hit number 1 on a few Quebec Anglophone radio stations, and the video for the single "You'll Never Know" achieved high global rotation on BET Jazz, and was nominated for an MTV/HBO Urbanworld 'Short Film' award.

The brothers have continued to work in the background, writing and producing for other artists, most recently releasing their first single in 20 years, *I Can't Wait To See You Smile*.

The McAuley Boys have shared the stage with the likes of 'The God Father of Soul', James Brown, 'The Queen of Soul', Aretha Franklin, Gladys Knight, The Temptations and many others. Notable performances include singing the Canadian National Anthem at the 1997 Major League Baseball All-Star Game, performing on the '97 Juno Awards, and representing Canada as music ambassadors at the 2000 Summer Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia. In 2012, The McAuley Boys were awarded Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee Medal for their achievements in music and service to their community.

On the heels of their successful period in music, youngest brother Randy became a star athlete

at Western University. As running back of the Mustangs, he was an all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns and kick return vards and a 7-time All-Canadian in Track and Field. He was inducted into Western's Football Wall of Champions, Western's Track and Field Wall of Honour and the Western Sports Hall of Fame. He and brother Mark are graduates of Western's Faculty of Law, where Mark was voted Valedictorian of his class. Mark is now a lawyer at Lerners LLP in London and Randy is a partner at Goodmans LLP in Toronto. George, a three-time graduate of Western, is currently Vice-Principal of Regina Mundi Catholic College at the London District Catholic School Board. In March 2023, he received Queen Elizabeth Il's Platinum Jubilee Medal for his achievements. in music and his anti-racism work in the community. Gary continues to produce music and is an entrepreneur actively involved with a number of tech and music start-ups.

Today, this famous London family with careers in music, education and law are never too far away from a microphone and a stage. They continue to share their harmonies with an audience when they can.



Scott Good

Scott Good is a composer, conductor, concert designer and trombonist whose music is driven by the desire to create beauty, evoke emotion, and play with groove. His music has been described as "a kind of majestic bestial reality" (Globe and Mail), "gloriously cacophonic" (Ottawa Citizen), "sumptuously orchestrated" (Montreal Gazzette), and "dynamic, vivid" (Winnipeg Free Press).

As Composer-In-Residence with London Symphonia (2015-present) and the Vancouver Symphony (2008-2011), he has composed numerous orchestral works and orchestral arrangements. Upcoming projects for orchestra include the premiere of *Lasker-Schüler* Songs for rising star soprano Midori Marsh and London Symphonia (2024), and two silent film scores: *The Passion of Joan of Arc* for a mixture of voices and period instruments to be premiered by Ensemble Caprice in Montreal in 2026, and a two-and-a-half hour score for large orchestra and chorus to the epic silent film classic *Metropolis* with the Kingston Symphony, celebrating the film's 100th anniversary (2027).

He has been commissioned by orchestras across Canada, including Orchestre symphonique de Montréal, National Arts Centre Orchestra, Calgary Philharmonic, Winnipeg Symphony, Orchestre de la francophonie, and the Esprit Orchestra. Major works include his orchestral score for the 1926 silent film *The Hands of Orlac* (Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony 2015), his multimedia family concert *The* Caboose Who Got Loose with solo cello, narration, and projections (Calgary Philharmonic 2022), and his acclaimed trumpet concerto, Between the Rooms "a riotous, percussive bacchanal" (For the Record) with Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony in 2007.

Inspired by the themes of the universal human condition, his lush oratorio *The Sleepers* contemplates the unity and equality of all humanity, whereas *Babbitt*, a raucous saxophone concerto, hailed by The *Vancouver Observer* as "luminous, virtuosic, gleaming music", is inspired by a mid-life crisis. From global extinction cataclysm in his Kurt Vonnegutinspired jazz orchestra work *Galapagos*, to a boiling stew in his overture *What the Chickpea Said to the Cook*, Scott finds inspiration to create compelling works from all walks and perspectives.

Good's role has evolved over time to include artistic direction, where he meshes his conducting skills with his knowledge as a composer and arranger to design and produce innovative concerts. These programs focus on modern compositions and hybrid genre music that imbue a widely inclusive atmosphere for our culturally diverse communities. Events of interest include *Belonging*, a concert of Arabic songs and classical Western compositions with poet/activist Najwa Zebian and songwriter Maryem Toller; In Remembrance, combining classical music with contemporary and traditional songs to reflect the deep, conflicted emotions around the topic of war and sacrifice; and Tapestry, a collaboration with The Light of East Ensemble exploring the music of the East Mediterranean. His aim with these diverse programs is to create bridges and connections revealing our common humanity through music. Good has an extensive catalog of chamber music compositions and has created works for ensembles such as I Furiosi, and the Madawaska String Quartet, organizations such as InnerChamber and the World Harp Congress, and soloists including trombonist Alain Trudel, and electric guitarist Tim Brady. He has composed test pieces for the Montreal International Music Competition, the Canadian Music Competition, and written for education institutions such as the Glenn Gould School and NACO Young Artists program. He has composed several pieces for children as part of Chamber Factory's Listen Up! program and served as a mentor in Esprit Orchestra's Creative Sparks high school program. Current chamber projects include music direction and arranging for the Lonely Child Project, a contemporary music/ contemporary circus hybrid theatrical work in collaboration with multi-hyphenate artist Stacie Dunlop and contemporary circus artists Angola Murdoch and Holly Treddenick, with the music of Claude Vivier.

Scott Good's passion for jazz and improvised music can be heard throughout his compositions, especially in hybrid projects with jazz artists and musicians from a variety of cultural backgrounds. Highlights include two major works for the Hard Rubber Jazz Orchestra, *Concerto for Cello* composed for Jeffrey Zeigler, and *Concerto for Improvisor* featuring Scott as composer, conductor, and soloist, the concert length crossover project *Conjunction*, revered as "one of the most fascinating concerts I've heard this year" by the Ottawa Jazz Scene, with the Gryphon Trio, jazz bassist Roberto Occhipinti and American-Cuban drummer Dafnis Prieto, arrangements and original composition *Wu Xing* (2018), and his 10-part tribute to author Kurt Vonnegut *Vonnegut and the Slaughterhouse Orchestra* co-written with singer-songwriter Dwight Schenk for rock band and chamber orchestra.

Scott lives in London Ontario with his wife Jennifer Schofield and two children Alex and Nick.

Dr. Gregg Redner

Gregg Redner has been Director of Music and Arts at Metropolitan United Church, since 2001. Prior to coming to London, Gregg held academic and church positions in New York City. He holds a PhD in Modern Languages from Exeter University in the U.K., a double Master of Music degree (Organ and Harpsichord) from the Juilliard School in New York City and is a Fellow of both The Royal Canadian College of Organists (FRCCO) and the National College of Music (FNCM). In April 2013 Gregg was awarded an Honorary Fellowship for Services to Music by the National College of Music & Arts, London, UK. His teachers have included Leonard Bernstein, Aaron Copland, Vincent Persichetti and Roger Sessions. His book 'Deleuze and Film Music' is published by Intellect Press an imprint of The University of Chicago Press.

Catherine Gray

Catherine Gray is Assistant Organist at Metropolitan as well as Co-Director of the Metropolitan Choir School. The holder of numerous professional diplomas Catherine was the recipient of the 2013 Kathleen Williams Award for the highest mark in the Colleague examination of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. In August 2015, she earned the Associate's Diploma in Organ Performance from the Royal Conservatory of Music, and holds the ARCT Diploma in Voice. In May 2016 Catherine passed the Fellowship Examination in Organ from the National College of Music, London, UK and in June of that same year, passed the Associateship Diploma of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. She holds Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Master of Music Degrees from The University of Western Ontario.

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
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
